B. Part-Time Faculty PD Funding

Dan Walsh shared the current availability of funding: \$1800 full-time and \$900 part-time; there has been a request to reevaluate monies available for part-time faculty. There are two options: 1) keep it the same or 2) make it prorated to number of units being taught.

Margot Lovett commented that if Tram Kumamoto is willing to increase the budget, we could consider equalizing the amount that part-timers are offered. Ann Marie Breslin asked if perhaps part-time faculty can bank the amounts so that they could use more the following year. Dan responded that Administration has not in the past let us bank monies and let them roll over. Nancy Allah emphasized that part-time faculty have done the same amount of training and work but do not receive the same amount. She feels that part-timers are disadvantaged since they do not have the same opportunities as full-timers.

EvaMarie Rodriguez-Morris shared concerns about banking since their schedules are not set for upcoming years and many teach at various colleges. Emily Quinlan asked if other colleges offer part-time faculty members funding for professional development that could then be combined. Anwar Hijaz noted that not all colleges offer funding for part-time faculty. Sumaya McCleave asked if the money is depleted every year. Dan Walsh responded that it varies from year to year; last year we were close to depleting. Taylor Brooks asked if there is a possibility of dividing monies by school if there are leftover funds. Not likely-accounting nightmare. Nancy Allah reminded senators that not all faculty teach at other colleges. It is unfair the way the money is distributed and part-timers need the same professional development opportunities.

C. Baccalaureate Degrees

Dan Walsh provided some background and asked the questions: Should we offer Baccalaureate degree? If yes, how do we decide on which ones and what is the process? Jenny Langrell shared that she feels these are tied together; however, not every program should move in this direction.

Dan Walsh reminded senators that the first question to discuss is whether or not Saddleback should offer these degrees. Tram Vo Kumamoto emphasized that it is important for us to consider the implications of Saddleback offering Baccalaureate degrees.
