### New <u>Kinesiology - Sports Administration</u> Associate of Arts

The Kinesiology - Sports Administration A.A. degree is designed to prepare students with essential knowledge and skills in the field of sports administration. The curriculum in this program provides transfer preparation for students interested in pursuing further education in Kinesiology with a degree emphasis in sports administration or sports management. This degree is ideal for those aspiring to pursue higher education or enter the workforce in this growing industry. With a well-rounded curriculum this program offers knowledge in areas such as sports management, event planning, facility operations, sports marketing, sports law, ethics, leadership, business principles, and basic finance and accounting. This program provides an educational background suitable for entry-level job positions as an assistant for recreation programming. sports marketing, facility operations, and athletic program coordination, in such environments as recreations centers, community sports organizations, youth programs, and schools. While an associate degree may support attempts to gain entry-level employment or promotion, a baccalaureate or higher degree is recommended for those considering professional careers, which can be achieved through transfer.

# New <u>EKG/ECG Technician</u> <u>Certificate of Completion</u>

Students in the EKG/ECG Certificate of Completion program learn skills related to cardiac testing, 12-lead ECG, Stress Testing and Holter monitoring. Emphasis on the cardiopulmonary anatomy, physiology, obtaining ECG recordings and measurements identifying cardiac rhythms. Coursework prepares for employment in a medical office, an ambulatory care center or hospital performing telemetry monitoring, preparation for Stress Testing and Holter Monitoring.
